Dear Friends and Supporters,

As Chairperson of Skagit Animals in Need, I am honored to present our 2024 Annual Impact Report. This year has been one of growth, challenges, and meaningful impact in our mission to prevent and respond to animal cruelty and neglect in Skagit County.

Through your generous support, we've been able to provide for 141 animals, find forever homes for 9 rescued animals, and provide critical assistance to pet owners facing temporary economic hardship. Our all-volunteer organization contributed over 3,448 hours of service, demonstrating the incredible dedication of our community to animal welfare.

In 2024, our core Rescue, Rehabilitation and Rehoming program continued to provide pathways to permanent, loving homes for animals in our care. Our Animal Assistance Program and Skagit Pet Pantries expanded our support of animal owners struggling economically to care for their animals.

As we look toward 2025, we remain committed to our vision that every animal is properly cared for in a manner that meets or exceeds Washington State law. The stories and accomplishments shared in this report are only possible because of supporters like you.

About Skagit Animals in Need

SAIN is an all-volunteer 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization dedicated to rescuing, rehabilitating, and rehoming animals who have been victims of cruelty or neglect. We work closely with local law enforcement to respond to animal welfare cases and provide comprehensive care for animals in need.

When animals have been denied basic care and comfort and are removed from their situations, they come to SAIN where they receive the nourishment, medical and farrier care, and love they've been deprived of. When they recover, we help them find homes of kindness. We also help owners afford necessary care for their animals when they are facing temporary economic struggles.

Our volunteer-driven approach allows us to maximize the impact of every dollar donated, with 82% of expenses going directly to animal care.


















Making Every Dollar Count

In 2024, SAIN raised just over \$110,000 through individual and business donations, grants, and our annual Tack Sale & Raffle. As a small, all-volunteer organization, we achieve remarkable impacts despite our modest revenue stream.

Our funding comes from multiple sources:

• Individual & Business Donations (cash & in-kind): 68%

• Tack Sale & Raffle: 15%

Grants: 11%

Adoption & Intake Fees: 3%

76% of what we spend goes directly to caring for the animals & helping them find safe and loving new homes. Our efficiency means that every dollar donated creates significant change in the lives of animals and their owners throughout Skagit County.

Without the overhead of a physical facility or paid staff, we maximize the impact of each donation. Our volunteers donate their time, expertise, and often their own resources to ensure that funding primarily supports animal care, veterinary services, feed, and direct assistance to pet owners in need.

The Impact of Your Support

In addition to our core Rescue, Rehabilitaiton & Rehoming work, two of our programs have farreaching impact in our community.

Skagit Pet Pantries: Filling Food Bowls Across the County

We purchased 6 pallets of dog food and 6 pallets of cat food for distribution to local food banks. Our partners at Community Action of Skagit County, who help us distribute the pet food, tell us just how important this program is:

This has been a tremendous benefit to those who rely on the network of food banks to meet their nutrition needs. Because of [this program], the people are no longer diverting a portion of their food to sustain their cherished pets...Even with [this program], the supply is quickly outstripped by the demand. There is no other program like SAIN's Skagit Pet Pantries in Skagit County...

A Life-Changing Difference: Animal Assistance Program

The Animal Assistance Program provides nano-grants to help people care for their beloved animals during times of financial hardship. One community member shares her story:



I am at a loss for words when it comes to describe how grateful I am to the SAIN program. My husband and I worked hard to be able to have horses...I unfortunately experienced a traumatic brain injury, which left me out of work while in and out of doctors appointments. My partner, unfortunately had to quit his job in Seattle to be able to drive me to appointments. He did end up finding something closer, but it's not covering the bills.

With our loss of income, we have had to cut back on our expenses and our biggest expense has been our horses. The amount of loss we have experienced was tremendous this year—I did not want to lose them, too. With the help of SAIN I have received enough help to be able to feed my horses during this time. This is been such a life-changing situation and you have made such a difference in such a short time.

I hope in the future I'm able to give back to the program to help fellow community members during tough times. The generosity of this program has alleviated some stress and has helped my mental health. I hope this program continues to help the community and their horses.
